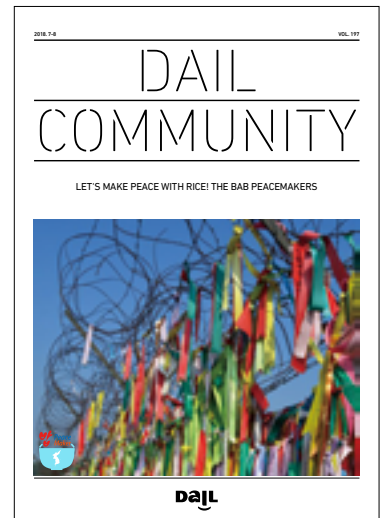

**The 4th Annual Bab Peacemakers Movement
for Peaceful Reunification and Reconciliation of the Koreas**

“Let’s Eat Together!”



Each year, come summer, we remind ourselves of the tragic fratricide of the Korean War. Then, in August, amid the Independence Day celebrations, we dream again. As the poet once said, the owl's cries start in the

spring and echo throughout summer, until finally the chrysanthemums blossom. We hope the day will come soon when our divided country is reunited, and we join together in songs of freedom and the dance of peace.

This year marks the fourth year of the Bab Peacemakers Movement. The aim of the Movement is to sit down and eat together in between North and South to bring about peace. When Reverend Choi Il-Do, founder of the Dail Community, proposed that we should invite North Korean soldiers and treat them to a hearty meal prepared by mothers in South Korea, we all thought this was a quixotic idea. But wouldn't you know it – at the South-North Korea Summit, the North and South Korean heads of state and generals actually sat down together for a meal of Dokdo shrimp and Pyeongyang naengmyeon.

On April 27, 2018, South and North Korea proclaimed the beginning of a new age of peace on the Korean Peninsula, opening a new chapter of history. With the whole world watching, the South and North Korean heads of state did what would have been unimaginable just a few months earlier. At the first

summit in 11 years, the two Koreas made clear their intentions of ending the decades of division and confrontation, and to bring about peace on the peninsula.

Through the Panmunjom Declaration, the Koreans agreed to facilitate comprehensive and groundbreaking advancement in inter-Korean relations, make joint efforts to alleviate the acute military tension and practically eliminate the danger of war on the Korean Peninsula, and actively cooperate to establish a permanent and solid peace regime on the Korean Peninsula.

They also agreed to declare the end of the Korean War within the year, transition from the current armistice to a peace treaty, and pursue trilateral meetings involving the two Koreas and the United States, or quadrilateral meetings involving the two Koreas, the United States and China. We sincerely hope that these efforts to establish a regime of peace on the Korean Peninsula will bear fruit.

Many of us call for peaceful reunification. However, we all have different ideas of what that means. Most of us will think of political and ideological unification. Of course, this should be our ultimate goal, but we need to be reunited emotionally first. So long as we all wish to see the Koreas reunited, we should not dismiss the efforts being made as a political show, but appreciate them as the first steps toward reconciliation. Crying out for reunification is pointless if we are going to stand by and watch our brethren starve to death. The principle of peaceful reunification is far from

complicated. "Bab" is the answer. We need to sit down at the same table and dine together.

The Bab Peacemaker Movement is committed to taking the lead and showing society the way to overcome social conflict and antagonism, including the gap between the haves and have nots, regional animosity, ideological polarization, and toward reunification of the Korean peninsula. By bringing religion and the church together, we will pave the road to national harmony and peaceful reunification. Through this, we will be able to bring down all walls that divide our society and nation, and will grow into a community of healing, reconciliation and union.

The mission of the Bab Peacemaker Movement follows Jesus' words: "Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds" (John 12:24). Drawing not on reasoning and calculation, but on the humanitarian spirit and literary imagination, we will continue to bridge all walks of society through food and prayer until the day comes when soldiers of the South and North clear the barbed wire from between us and share a meal over the same table.

"Bab" is the answer, just as service and sharing are the only answer to union and reconciliation. To sit across the dining table from another is to accept, understand, and communicate with the other person. We dream of our Babfor initiative at Panmunjom spreading all along the demarcation line that divides the Koreans. From the Yellow Sea to the easternmost

reaches of the barbed wire fence, let us invite each other to eat. The movement for reunification must be a movement of grassroots reconciliation. We invite our readers to also engage in their own grassroots reunification efforts.

The 4th Annual Bab Peacemakers Movement will be held on August 8th at the Odusan Unification Tower in Paju in the DMZ. If we can sit down for a meal together, we will be able to respect each other and achieve peace. Please submit your applications to join us at the Odusan Unification Tower in Paju on August 8th. Let us gather, eat, sing, and pray together for peace in the land.

Babfor Senior Citizens' Outing to Jeongseon, Gangwondo

On May 2, on the day of Five Loaves of Bread and Two Fishes, we traveled to Jeongseon of Gangwondo with 60 of the senior citizens in our Babfor Community to commemorate Family Month.

When we gathered at Babfor headquarters early in the morning, it seemed the rains would never stop, but once we arrived at Jeongseon, the skies cleared. On our way to Jeongseon, we handed out snacks and briefed everyone on the day's itinerary. The trip from Cheongnyangni to Jeongseon was by no means a short one, but no one fell asleep. The bus was filled with chatter and laughter all the way.

We arrived in Jeongseon around 11AM, where we served the seniors a meal of wild thistle rice, a Jeongseon staple. They must have liked the food, since many finished two or more bowls. While it could have been too early for lunch for some, we begin our daily meal sharing at 11AM at Babfor, so it was just in time.

As luck would have it, the Jeongseon Arirang Traditional Market was open the day we were there. We arrived at the market at 12:30, and split up into

groups of 5 seniors plus 1 staff member. Each group was given a budget to enjoy the various things to eat and see at the market. We were concerned some seniors might get lost as the market was so crowded, but with everyone looking out for each other, we were able to wrap up the visit to the market without a hitch.

After leaving the Jeongseon market, we visited the grave of King Danjong in Jangleung of Yeongwol. A friendly guide talked us through the life and history surrounding King Danjong, and the scenery from Jangleung was breathtaking.

On our way back to Cheongnyangni, we stopped by the Hwangdun jjinbbang (steamed bun) village in Wonju where we bought everyone on the bus a box of steaming hot buns as a souvenir.

Before heading back home after the day-long trip, the seniors thanked us for the day. Many of them are seldom able to venture outside Cheongnyangni or their neighborhoods, and we thank our individual donors and corporate sponsors for giving our senior citizens such a wonderful gift.

Greetings from the field from the Dail Community of the Philippines.

The eyes of the world are on Korea as we embark on the road toward peaceful reunification. In the meantime, the Philippines have been swept by Barangay Captain election fever. I know little about politics, but hope the newly elected officials help those in abject poverty better their lives, and that God makes his justice and fairness flow over the land like a river.

At Long Last, in Kamansi as Well...

We have at long last begun delivering aid supplies to the children we are supporting through our 1:1 sponsorships. The Philippines is full of ridiculously rich people, but close to nothing is being done to help the poor. It was only with help from our donors in Korea and the U.S. that our 1:1 child sponsorships were possible, and the supplies and gifts their donations made possible will prove massively helpful.

We had a hard time deciding what the first batch of aid supplies would be, since the children we engage are in desperate need of pretty much everything. But

we decided 'Bab' was the answer. One has to eat to go to school, and eat to stay healthy. This is why we sent the children home with sacks of rice. Their parents were as excited as the kids themselves to receive the generous gifts of rice. It was both a pleasing and heart-wrenching experience, and I had to give each of the children a giant hug.

On the other hand, there are children for whom we have arranged sponsors but who have not yet received contributions, and still more children who have applied for a sponsorship but are still waiting to be matched. Their parents are especially anxious to meet a benefactor who will make it possible for them to let their children study in peace.

Next month the new school year begins, and we have promised to provide school supplies that the children will need. This announcement was especially welcome news to the children and parents of Paradise Village, which was burnt down in a recent fire.

There still are many children desperately waiting for sponsors. It would be great if we could find sponsors for each of these children as well. If you happen to be reading this letter and find it in your heart to give the children of the Philippines' poverty-stricken villages a chance to dream and have hope, please do not hesitate to contact us!

Our month-long summer bible school recently ended. Yes, really. It lasted a whole month. This is the way we do things at the Kamansi Center of the Dail Community of the Philippines. The village is a poor one, and one that floats on the sea. This means the kids have little to do and nowhere to really go. Every morning, our children gathered to sing hymns, study, read, write, and memorize the bible, and share bread freshly baked at our center each morning. If only churches in Korea could do the same.

On the last day of bible school, we even had a graduation ceremony. Like a lot of things here in the Philippines, the graduation ceremony was a grand one. The children came dressed in their best clothes, bringing their parents along. I called each of the children to the stage and handed them their graduation certificates, congratulating them and giving them my blessings. Following the graduation ceremony, the children put on a performance they had been practicing a long time for. Watching the children sing, dance, and even perform ballet, I was astonished by their talents.

Perhaps I could have noticed what the children were capable of if I had paid more attention – I promised myself to be more attentive next year.

Taking Girls with Sickle Cell Disease to Hospital

We took Catherine and Irene, suffering from the hereditary disease 'sickle cell anemia', to a hospital. Fortunately the hospital was just a 30 minute's drive from the Babfor center. Catherine was already registered at the hospital. While she should have been visiting for monthly checkups and doctor's prescriptions, this was her first time visiting in several months.

Irene's last checkup was in 2014, and she has left her illness unattended for 4 years. Although I am no doctor, I knew she was in bad shape from the whites of her eyes turning yellow and her arms and legs becoming so thin they could break any day. The girls had their blood checked for hemoglobin levels and to check for any malaria infection. Fortunately, they didn't have malaria, but their hemoglobin levels were 6 to 7, which is half of what is normal. They required

immediate blood transfusions.

Irene was in even worse shape, as we expected. Having never received a proper examination in four years, Irene had even more drugs prescribed, and required additional testing of her liver, kidneys, and bones at a larger hospital in Kampala. Fortunately, her liver and kidneys are holding on, and her bones are still fine. Only after two days of intensive additional testing was Irene able to receive a transfusion.

The hospital seemed to neglect the girls because of the way they were dressed, and we demanded an apology. Catherine and Irene are without help from parents or guardians, and live every day in pain and suffering. It was only through 1:1 sponsorships that they were able to resume treatment, and it is our hope their bodies and minds heal well. Thank you for your support and love. Our Children, Our Hope!

Reusable Sanitary Pads

In African schools, there are several reasons students are unable to attend school on a daily basis. Homes may be too far from school, parents may have kids do farm and housework, their families might not be able to afford schooling, or the children may have health problems. For teenage girls, there is another concern : menstruation.

Most children do not have access to sanitary pads, and are forced to use strips of fabric. Due to lack of proper education as to their menstrual cycles, many girls will come to school, find out they have started menstruating, and hurry back home. This means frequent absences and early leaves for the girls, keeping them from focusing on the studies.

We did some research, and it turns out the same was true for the girls at Kitiko and Kigo elementary schools. A generous sponsor provided 200 reusable and washable sanitary pads for these girls. We purchased the pads from a social corporation where Ugandan women manufacture them firsthand, together with educational materials. After teaching the girls about proper use of the pads, and about the menstrual cycle, we distributed them. The girls'

teachers, who were all too aware of the problem, were very pleased and appreciated the gift.

It is rewarding to see the girls so happy to have the pads, which will let them miss less school days. The hope is these girls will grow up to become women of sound mind and body. Once again we thank our sponsors for their generous help.

Sophia, who graduated as a member of the fourth chapter of the Hope Class last year and who is now a studious elementary school student, is having the time of her life. Sophia lives with her mom, three older brothers and one younger brother. Recently they were joined by Sophia's new baby sister. That makes six siblings. There was some even better news for Sophia : the mud hut they used to live in has been turned into a sturdy brick house, one with a kitchen and even an indoor bathroom.

After hearing Sophia's tragic story, a sponsor in Korea offered to purchase the site the mud hut was standing on, and Dail Community Ambassador Ms. Yoon Seok-Hwa provided the funds for tearing down the mud hut and replacing it with a sturdy brick home.

Sophia's mother and her siblings had prayed they could purchase that old mud hut so that they would not have to leave and be scattered, especially since Sophia's mother, who used to sell charcoal, was no

longer able to work due to her illness. That prayer has been answered in the form of a brick home that is larger and even stronger than they house they prayed for.

The Dail Community of Tanzania, with help from the two sponsors, purchased the mud hut last year. We had originally planned to complete construction before the rainy season in March, but due to various circumstances, work was completed in early May.

Sophia's baby sister was conceived right around the time the home was completed. We were concerned for the health of Sophia's mother, but fortunately both the child and mother are well.

Sophia's mother smiled as they moved into the new home. She says she has no worries about where the children will go if she might suddenly pass away. Once again, we would like to thank our two generous sponsors. Thank you!

The center alternates between serving rice meals (rice, potato stew, bean stew) and bread meals (bread and juice). Some will be carrying a sibling on their backs while holding the hands of another. Around a third of the children come with plastic bags or bowls so they can take the food home to share with their families. Most of the residents of the village do not have frequent access to rice due to economic hardship. Watching the children pack up the portions of rice for their families at home is both a heart-warming and heart-wrenching experience. We want to provide our children more hearty and filling meals. We would like to have larger portion sizes. A Hundred Dollars can make this

We Follow in the Footsteps of Our Seniors! –The first volunteering experience of the Ivy Class of the fourth graders at Sadong Elementary School

Watching the middle and high school students volunteering together at last year's Christmas event, I decided I just had to bring the kids from my class as well. Actually, I have been thinking of this ever since I first started working with Babfor four years ago. I contacted a number of agencies to volunteer at with the kids in my grade, but many were hesitant to accept help from elementary school students who were not family members. Of course, I understood why. Not many people are going to want to have a bunch of rowdy and inexperienced elementary school kids come and go without doing much work.

I brought up the topic of participating in a Babfor service to my new class in March, and they were excited about 'volunteering'. Encouraged by the

positive reaction, I inquired with Babfor, who said they were open to elementary school students. I visited Babfor in April to take photos to show the children what sort of work they were going to be doing, and began laying out detailed plans.

I read the book *The Easiest Job in the World—Volunteering* to teach myself how to prepare to volunteer. Pastor Choi Il-Do's story, *Creating a World Where Nobody Goes Hungry on Sharing Changes the World* inspired me to study even harder, as I read into what work NGOs do, the mission and work of the Dail Community, stories from the field, and history. We held a 'Babfor Bazaar' and sent 93,700 Won in proceeds as a donation.

Finally, the day arrived. There were fewer adult volunteers than we expected, but for the participating children, it was a valuable opportunity. The boys and girls were busy at work all day, peeling garlic, washing cabbages, handing out food, moving and washing dishes, and cleaning the canteen and kitchen. At times they were 11-year-olds, but thankfully, they powered through. The seniors at the center had nothing but

praise for the kids. I want to thank the Babfor chef and volunteers for patiently explaining to the children what they could do, and the Babfor staff for giving the children the opportunity to grow through sharing.

The kids didn't remember, but in 2015, the 5th graders at our school ran a fundraising project to send vitamins to Babfor in the Philippines. This led to participation in a Babfor meal service in the Philippines in 2016, our donation to the Kamansi Village in 2017, and this year's Babfor meal service in Korea. I hope the Ivy Class has realized that the true spirit of service is not about only giving what I want to give, but to give what is needed. Hopefully,

good seeds have been sown and will grow into good fruit.

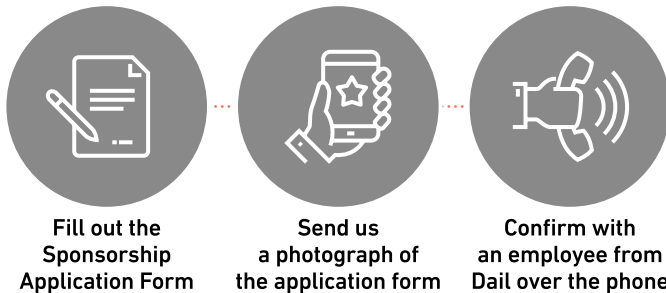
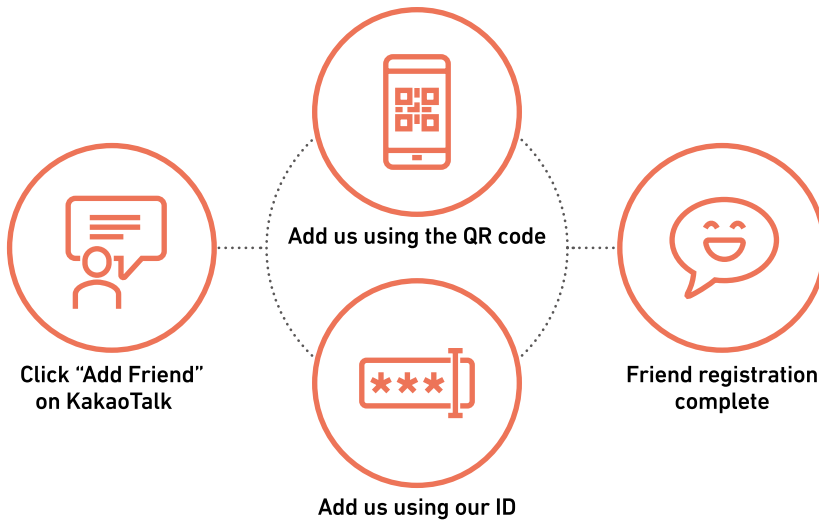
