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**COVER STORY**

There are five new full members of Dail Community, celebrating the 30th anniversary of its establishment. We'd like to offer our blessing to our new members who will dedicate themselves to leading the community for the next 30 years.

The Beginning in Cheongnyangni

(from 1988 to 1998)

In November 1988, at Cheongnyangni Square where biting winds blew, the seed of Dail Community was sown when Pastor Ildo Choi encountered an elderly man from Hamgyeong-do Province. What started as a bowl of seolleongtang (ox bone soup) given to an elderly man who had collapsed after four days of starvation led to instant noodles being provided to the seniors living

near Cheongnyangni Vegetable Market who were barely getting by and the homeless taking shelter around Cheongnyangni Station. Eventually, hot bowls of rice and side dishes began to be served to those in need. Ever since that fateful day in 1988, warm meals have been shared with our marginalized neighbors every single day for the past three decades.





The First Steps into the World and the Beginning of Dail Spiritual Training

(from 1999 to 2008)

When we hearing the news that many of children who are defecting from North Korea and come to Hunchun after crossing the Dumangang River, also known as the Tumen River, Dail Community, which began its ministry by helping orphans in Yanbian.

Later, we began providing assistance to the poor in Vietnam, the United States, Cambodia, the Philippines and Nepal.

In Korea, we managed to open Dail Angel's Hospital, which has been our long-cherished wish, and relocated the Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters. Also, Mugan-ri Dail Community, which is the spring and origin of Dail spirituality, as well as DTS Training Center and Seolgoksan Dail Community opened their doors, thereby laying the groundwork for providing holistic healing, and commenced the ministry based on spiritual training.





From Bapfor Cheongnyangni to Africa and to the North-South Korea Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters

(from 2009 to 2018)

The Babfor Sharing Movement, which began in Cheongnyangni, extended beyond Asia all the way to Africa between 2009 and 2018. At seventeen branches in ten countries worldwide, our brothers and sisters in need are looked after through a wide range of programs and activities. In the past 30 years, more than 10 million bowls of rice have been shared at Cheongnyangni Babfor alone. The sharing of a meal continued wherever Dail went, and it has led to the Peace Through Meals Movement and the Bab Peacemaker held for the fourth time in August 2018. And finally, the establishment of the North-South Korea Babfor Sharing Movement

Headquarters was proclaimed and its vision was shared. As a fruit of the overseas ministries pursued in the past 20 years, the second generation of Babfor members has joined the ministry of Dail Community worldwide. In Nepal, for instance, a native was appointed as the director of the Dail Community branch, which is a first for all overseas Dail Community branches. Dail Community now plans to carry out the Babfor Sharing Movement in North Korea. The North-South Korea Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters (or the Korean Peninsula Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters) is the new dream and vision of Dail.





“Bab (Rice) Is Peace! Let’s Share Bab!”

At Odusan Unification Observatory in Paju, the 4th Bab Peacemaker, a nationwide peaceful unification movement for the reconciliation and union of North and South Korea, was held on August 8, 2018. The Bab Peacemaker Movement, which had been carried out at Dorasan Peace Park in the demilitarized zone (DMZ), was held at Odusan Unification Observatory that overlooks the land of the north this year, which made it all the more meaningful.

The opening performance by the chamber orchestra of Bongeun Elementary School and the performance of “Our Wish Is Reunification” by a boys and girls choir announced the kick-off of the 4th Bab Peacemaker organized to promote peace on the Korean peninsula.

The performances were followed by an opening speech by Pastor Sungki Cho and a commemorative speech by Pastor Ildo Choi, who serves as the standing representative of Bab Peacemaker. Congratulatory speeches by Jongsam Park, a former World Vision Korea who now serves as an advisor to Bab Peacemaker, and Pastor Jonggeun Park, who serves as the co-chair of the organization, reminded the audience of the significance of the movement.

The encouragement speeches given by Professor

Jangchun Yu, a member of the Planning Committee, Sangmin Kim, a former Assemblyman, and Jongho Shin, the Chairman of the Board, noted the significance of “bab (rice)” in our times as well as true peace.

Seongjin Jeong, the Pastor of Kwangsung Church who is the co-chair of the organization, Seungjung Ju from Juan Presbyterian Church in Incheon, and Im Seong-bin, the President of Presbyterian University and Theological Seminary, sent in video messages to express their regrets about their absence, to encourage North and South Korea to toward peace and to offer their congratulations on the hosting of the event.

The inspirational speeches and messages were followed by a congratulatory duet performance given by tenor Mantaek Ha and soprano Miju Kim, who presented “The Prayer” and conveyed the hopes of countless Koreans through the beautiful lyrics and with their heartwarming vocals.

The highlight of the program was “Bab (Rice) Is Peace” staged by the musical team of a theater company called Jajeongeo Nalda (Flying Bicycle). Their performance reminded the audience of the sorrows of being a divided country and shed light on our present reality where North Korea and South Korea are facing each other on the road to

peace 70 years after the ceasefire. The musical came to a close with the actors playing the roles of North and South Korean soldiers eating at the same table, offering compliments on one another's local dishes. The closing scene showed that with bab, we can achieve true peace on the Korean Peninsula beyond the superficial peace pursued by the two parties for their own benefits.

This special performance made the audience realize once again that bab is peace.

Then, there was a recitation of the joint declaration of Bab Peacemaker, a tradition that has been carried out for the past four years. The presenters urged that the inter-Korean summit be continually organized to yield tangible results, and that a six-party summit involving the USA, China, Russia and Japan be held. The wish for peace and for the Korean Peninsula Babfor Sharing

Movement Headquarters to expand its scope of activities to North Korea was also voiced.

Lastly, the Raw Rice Relay reminded everyone of the hope that will be shared with the people of North Korea through the donated rice. The organizers sang "The Song of Bab" together with the guests and declared the plans to send rice to North Korea during the traditional holidays next year so that it can be delivered to those losing hope due to famine and poverty. With this declaration, the 4th Bab Peacemaker came to a successful close.

As for the Bab Peacemaker, which has been held for the fourth time this year with the faith that true peace begins from a meal shared together rather than the pursuit of self-interest, we are now preparing ourselves to realize our dream of sharing a meal with the people of North Korea.

At bookstores, we often see books intended to provide comfort and encouragement to young adults. Young adults these days need to invest a substantial amount of their time and energy into building their resumes in order to survive the intense competition in the job market. Despite this,

the members of the Korean University Council for Social Service (KUCSS) decided to take themselves away from their frenetic schedules to help others in the sweltering heat this summer for 94 days. It was a rigorous yet fruitful journey that filled their hearts with warmth, and they share with us their stories.

Babfor and Bbangfor involved providing food to hungry children, free-of-charge. Whenever I knelt down and made eye contact with each and every child, as I gave out rice and bread, feelings that cannot be described in words rushed over me every time. I felt so overwhelmed that I didn't even mind the numbness in my knees. – Seokjun Kim



Looking back now, I think I tried to retain inside my heart the smiles and warmth of the children during every activity, every single day. The opportunity to share warmth was like a valuable lesson that taught me the true meaning of sharing and love. – Hyeonbin Kang



When the volunteers were in the position to use the knowledge and skills they've gained through their college majors, they seemed most enthusiastic and shone most brightly. While watching them, I was able to think in depth about my own major and take pride in it. I think this experience became a great motivator for us all. – Jihyeon Yun



When I was playing with the children, they'd often say to me, "Euo Heung Mut Pat a." At first, I didn't know what it meant, so I just smiled in response, but I later found out that it means

"We are friends." After realizing this, I felt very grateful and touched. I'll miss the volunteers who have become "friends" as well. Let's always stay together, Coming Soon! – Heeju Kim



At first, I thought of "volunteering" as a way to build my resume and to fulfill certain requirements. This has changed completely after this experience. Now, what volunteering means to me is "sharing your heart"; it's neither giving nor receiving, but sharing. I realized that what I had received from the children was much more than what I had given them, so I felt sad and regretful on my way back to Korea. This opportunity has changed my life. The reason people need to volunteer has become clear to me. I now have a reason to return to Cambodia. I am now grateful for everything in my life. – Geumhee Kim



Before the volunteer trip, I had heard that the kids we'd be helping were living on a landfill, and that made me wonder how they could live in such a dreadful place. As soon as I arrived, I was shocked by the stench coming from the garbage at the site. While preparing to give out bread, I noticed the children greeting us with bright smiles on their faces, and I became ashamed of the thoughts that had crossed my mind before arriving in Cambodia. I had questioned how anyone could live on a landfill, but I realized that it was a precious home to those living there and that they were all striving toward their respective dreams. This experience compelled me to do a little self-reflection. – Yeongin Lee



The Tomorrow We Can't Wait For

Perhaps the names engraved on the bracelets we've given out to the children, while promising them that we'd return again, will fade away over time, but the time we spent in Cambodia this past summer has presented us with unforgettable memories. We've also gained, deep inside our hearts, the motivation to spend each day in a more productive and enthusiastic way, instead of complaining of our hardships. Nearing the end of our volunteer program, a professor from the Royal University of Fine Arts (RUFA), with which KUCSS runs a student exchange program, said to us, "From this place, where you have volunteered, there will be children who will volunteer as you have 10 years from now." This reminded us that what we leave behind at the site of our volunteer work aren't just traces of our own happiness. Actually, a young man, who had received meals from Babfor Center

in Phnom Penh when he was a child, joined us on stage to deliver a music performance, which was quite meaningful. The song that he sang while playing the guitar was "You Were Born to Be Loved." He sang quietly in both Korean and Khmer, and we thought perhaps he'd been inspired by someone who had come from Korea to perform the song while playing the guitar 10 years ago. There was something that I've caught myself doing while working with the university students this summer. I kept observing the facial expression of each of the volunteers. What I noticed was that discomfort, anxiety and perhaps even a little frustration – which is not unusual when you are in an unfamiliar environment – were replaced by feelings of joy, as they talked and played with the children. I realized that the feelings of discomfort and distress can never win against the feelings of joy and excitement. To those who want to volunteer overseas but are hesitant because they don't feel that they are ready yet, I'd like to tell them to have courage. Our story has not ended; it is ongoing.



CHINA

Because Hunchun has a short summer and a long winter, the local residents typically don't use an air conditioner, except in certain regions. In fact, there is a place where people didn't even need to use an electric fan the entire summer one year. However, an early yellow alert for high temperatures (38°C) was issued for Hunchun this summer.

Despite the scorching heat, the Affectionate Heart Society of China Dail Community was still in high energy. We engaged in summer cleaning, put up welcome signs and prepared snacks for the university students who would return to us for the summer break.

Yehwa Choi came from Cambodia and stayed with us for 3 weeks. She brought beautiful t-shirts from Cambodia to give to the youngsters at the Children's Welfare Center and even donated money to pay for their dinner. Chunyeon An, who left us last year and has been in the workforce for almost a year now, visited us for the relocation

of Registration Identification. While watching her take care of the younger children, as she had learned from the senior members before her, I became very grateful of this tradition.

Jihyang Jeon, who is currently studying International Economics and Trade at Shenyang University of Chemical Technology, returned and found a part-time job here. Joseon Wang studying at Yanbian University Medical College paid us a short visit because she had medical training even during the school break. We actually visited her on campus as a way to show her our support and to encourage.

To better accommodate the returning students, we purchased additional bunk beds and dining tables. It can become somewhat uncomfortable and inconvenient when it gets crowded, especially during the intense heat, but the members of the Affectionate Heart Society of China Dail Community seemed all the merrier. This reminded me of how China Dail Community is a true community.

I wish to share with you a letter from Yeeun Shin, the leader of Smile Bank, the members of which accumulated unlimited smiles from countless people this past summer.

Hello. We are Smile Bank, a voluntary club that has been in operation at Korean International School in Ho Chi Minh City for four years since 2014. "Smile Bank" means that we can accumulate boundless smiles from ourselves and the people we help when we volunteer.

Our club was organized by those who wanted to provide help and happiness – no matter how little they might be – to the local residents, children suffering from exposure to defoliants, and those facing hardships in their everyday lives.

Our club is comprised of students who are interested in psychology, counseling and social welfare and who want to offer a helping hand to those having social difficulties. The members are all very passionate, tenacious, empathic and understanding, and they serve others, while putting themselves in their shoes and putting

them first. We mainly visit the House of Heavenly Blessing, an orphanage located in Cu Chi that provides shelter to children suffering from exposure to defoliants, to clean the facilities and take care of the kids with disabilities. We also volunteer at Babfor located in 7 Phu My Hung, giving out meals prepared with love and care to the people in need. While volunteering here in Vietnam, we've learned more about the local communities and realized so many things while helping those suffering from hardships including disabilities resulting from defoliant exposure.

Fortunately, we received donations of school supplies and even school uniforms from our sponsors of child, also known as the "Donation Angels." Look at the photograph and see how happy the children look! They weren't the only ones who expressed great joy. Even their parents and the staff shouted, "I am happy~"

Mind you, this was an unexpected and pleasant surprise in Camansi, where people think nothing of the black, polluted sea and poverty. (^^)

There is a volunteer team that visits us every Saturday these days. They are from the famous JIC Language Academy located in Cebu. Director John Jo visits us together with the English instructors as well as students of various nationalities to play with the children. It's a global volunteer team comprised of members from the Philippines, Taiwan, Vietnam and Korea. On the other side of the center, there are people baking bread as a way to serve these



children. The students from the language academy were offered a chance to participate in this volunteer work. Thanh and Duc, a mother and son from Vietnam, helped baked bread. They explained that there is an English-learning boom back home in Vietnam, a trend that is observed alongside its booming economy. After baking bread, the young mother, Thanh, showed interest in the work performed by Dail Community, asking various questions. We explained to her the meal prayer of Dail Community and the word of the Bible quoting Jesus who declared, “I am the bread of life.”

All of a sudden, Thanh began to shed tears... and didn't stop it for a long time. It is moments like this that we become very moved and inspired. Share love for Sindhupalchok Dail Orphanage

The construction of Dail Orphanage in Sindhupalchok has regrettably come to a halt due to lack of funds.

While expanding the main entrance area to accommodate more people, we had to stop this project because the donor from Korea who had promised a donation of 200 million Korean won was only able to afford 50 million won due to financial difficulties.

All of the members of Nepal Dail Community have been devoted to the construction of the orphanage, hoping that the church and the orphanage would lead to the revival and transformation of Sindhupalchok, where human trafficking was rampant and which suffered the biggest damage during the massive earthquake in 2015. They are now praying earnestly for the project to continue.

In addition to the construction project, the

Babfor operations in Kathmandu had to be ceased due to the regulatory clampdown on foreign non-governmental organization (NGO) operations in the country by the central authorities.

We desperately need your prayer and support.

We wish for the day when Babfor will resume its operations to take care of the sponsored children and the construction of the orphanage in Sindhupalchok to continue. For this, we wait for angels who will make donations for the orphanage construction project.

Muna first came to us when she was just 12 years old and grew up while eating the bab we served her. From the age of 14, she has been visiting us not just for a meal, but to volunteer for other children.

While volunteering at Nepal Dail Community, Muna had a chance to meet a volunteer group from Handong Global University on a vision trip, and she began fostering the dream of attending Handong Global University.. Ever since then, she has been asking what she needs to do in order to gain admission to the university and studied extremely hard to make the grades. While watching the volunteers and missionaries from Korea at work,

she envisioned herself helping people in need when she grows older. With great love for her country, Muna hopes to return to Nepal after her studies in Korea in order to contribute to the betterment of her country and people.

After hearing the news of Muna receiving her acceptance letter, the members of Nepal Dail Community immediately threw a party and everyone rushed over to congratulate her. Although we are saddened by the fact that we won't be able to see our beloved Muna for some time, we will pray for her as she pursues her studies in a distant foreign country.

Muna will be spending a whopping 4 years away from her home and family, but we know we can rest assured that she will be fine as she will be surrounded by her new family, Korea Dail Community.

The Beautiful Change Project for Gorret, 17-year-old Girl Suffering from Jaw Tumor

While walking around the neighborhood for a child sponsorship survey this past July, I was approached by some of the villagers asking me to meet with a girl who was in need of urgent help. I immediately turned around to follow them to a house. Upon my arrival, a teenage girl walked out of a dark room and I gasped as soon as I saw her. It was because of the enormous tumor growing on her jaw. Her name is Gorret and she turned 17 this year. Her family was doing when her father was around, but after his sudden death from a heart attack, the family began to suffer from major financial problems. That is why Gorret stopped going to school after grade 4. On top of that, she has been afflicted with a jaw tumor. In order to have the tumor removed by surgery, she and her family visited a national medical center of Uganda several years ago, but they lost all hope when they heard that the operation would cost 5 million Ugandan shillings (approx. 1.7 million Korean won).

Gorret, who lost her mother at a young age, lives with her stepmother, who is actually battling cancer. After hearing Gorret's story, I presented

her case to the Korean missionaries and doctors engaged in medical mission work nearby as well as a plastic surgeon who was here in Uganda for a short-term mission trip. I was told that the operation would be difficult to perform in Uganda. This news broke my heart, but I explained the situation to Gorret and told her not to lose courage. Four months later, I was contacted by one of the teachers at Kitiko Primary School who knew Gorret and was told that her tumor was getting bigger and that she had trouble eating and speaking. The teacher, worried that she'd die if left as she was, implored me to search for another solution. She even informed me that her stepmother had recently died from cancer. So I visited Gorret again and saw that the tumor had become massive. The tumor had even grown into her mouth, causing slurred speech. The staff and I began looking for a hospital where Gorret could receive medical examinations and surgery. At the advice of one of the missionaries, we visited CoRSU Hospital, established by an NGO, that is staffed with local and European doctors who specialize in plastic surgery and rehabilitation.

After taking a look at the CT scans, the doctor informed us that, fortunately, the tumor is benign and it is possible to perform the operation at the hospital. We were told that the earliest possible date for surgery was August 8 and we made an appointment then and there. However, Gorret developed sores inside the mouth, perhaps due to extreme stress and anxiety about the upcoming operation. More importantly, her blood test revealed that she was suffering from severe inflammation that required immediate treatment. Upon seeing her in such a terrible condition, her attending doctor called the other doctors and rescheduled the operation from August 8 to July 4. Gorret's story was introduced through the Prayer Letter and Pastor Ildo Choi's Sharing the Heart, which helped draw people's attention to her and compelled them to make generous donations.

Gorret became hospitalized on July 2 and got prepared for surgery through doctor consultation and interview. Then, on July 4 at 8 a.m., her surgery finally began. The operation, which involved removing the entire tumor from her jaw and taking one of the bones from her leg to reconstruct her lower jaw, took more than 8 hours, and thankfully,

it was a great success. Gorret persevered through it all, and after enduring the agonizing pain while recovering at the hospital for 10 days and then at home, she went to the hospital again three weeks after surgery to have the stitches removed. Although the swelling hasn't gone down completely, she looks completely different from before, and she barely recognizes herself in the mirror. She needs to undergo further treatment, however, as her gums need to be repositioned over the course of 2 years, after which her lower teeth, which were removed during surgery, need to be replaced. I ask that you continue to take an interest in and support Gorret so that she can keep experiencing beautiful changes not only in her appearance but in various other aspects of her life.

TANZANIA

We Need Mosquito Nets to Prevent Malaria Infection!

The No. 1 leading cause of death in Africa is AIDS, followed by Malaria. The malaria parasite is typically transmitted to humans by the bite of an infectious mosquito, and it travels in the bloodstream, eventually leading to death in a person with a compromised immune system. The residents of the Kunduchi quarry site earn just 1~3 US dollars a day, and it is difficult for them to buy nutritious food for their families of 4 to 8 on such a low income. It costs at least 5 US dollars to be tested for malaria and purchase therapeutic drugs, but because it's 2 days' worth of wages, they choose to not go to the hospital unless they are feeling extremely ill. Under these circumstances, the malaria mortality rate in this particular region is inevitably high, and children infected with malaria come to us at Babfor Center every single day to seek help.

The simplest and most basic way of preventing malaria infection is to install mosquito nets. This is why Tanzania Dail Community has been carrying out

the Mosquito Distribution Movement for Malaria Prevention for the past two years. We provided 4- to 5-person mosquito nets to 300 households two years ago and to 400 households last year. We provided mosquito nets to 800 households this year, with plans to supply additional 700 mosquito nets in September and October. We also plan on supplying 2,000 nets in Kunduchi with around 5,000 resident households and nearby villages. A single 4- to 5-person mosquito net costs 5 US dollars. I ask that you take part in the Mosquito Distribution Movement for Malaria Prevention, which can save valuable lives. Thank you!

It was especially meaningful that we got to celebrate together with Sangwon Park, an ambassador of Dail Community who dedicated himself to raising funds for the construction of Dail Vision Center, CEO Hyungwoo Lee of Midas IT Co., Ltd., who graciously donated to pay for the construction costs, the executives and employees of Midas IT, Chairman Ildo Choi and Standing Representative Yeonsoo Kim. guestrooms for volunteers.

After completing the construction project, we will be in need of various types of furniture, fixtures and supplies such as desks and chairs, bookshelves, baking machines, equipment and materials for the sewing class, library supplies, around 2,000 books, kitchen supplies, dining tables and chairs, and furniture for the two guestrooms.

We will now begin erecting the building, while praying that the supplies we need will be ready for us once the construction work is finished. We believe that God will touch people's hearts to rant our prayers. Asante! Thank you!

During the summer break of 2018, a youth volunteer team comprised of four boys broke a sweat while volunteering with Dail Community of USA. I'd like to introduce to you the members of the youth volunteer team who are two pairs of brothers: Jacob (Gr. 10) and Joshua (Gr. 9), and Chris (Gr. 10) and Andrew (Gr. 9). They contacted us at Dail Community of USA one day to tell us they'd like to spend a meaningful summer break this year by helping people in need. When they came in on their first day, the two pairs of brothers were surprised to see one another, as they were best friends from the same neighborhood, attending the same high school. Just as the saying goes, "Great minds think alike," these young men decided to volunteer without planning it together, and they formed a group to help their neighbors for around 2 months.

Jacob and Joshua, in particular, told us that while visiting their relatives in Korea with their parents at the beginning of the summer, they had an opportunity to visit Nepal Dail Community where the entire family volunteered together. They explained that they learned a lot while working with the children at Nepal Dail Community Center and Dail Hope Class, and they were inspired to become child sponsors and to pray for their dreams and future. Their story made me feel very proud of them.

Their visit to Nepal became an impetus for contacting us at Dail Community of USA to continue their volunteer work.

The four-member youth volunteer team visited

Cross Care Pointe, an NGO in partnership with Dail Community of USA, three times a week for around two months to give out food supplies to the vulnerable people in our community and reorganize the donated goods.

They became the first ones to arrive at the site, where they organized the food supplies to be given out according to their categories and put them inside boxes. They also picked out rotten vegetables and fruits. Despite working for hours, they gave their all, without taking a break, and everyone at Cross Care Pointe praised them, saying that they were a big help. There are fewer volunteers during the summer months because most people are away on vacation, so the Dail youth volunteer team was truly a big help and we couldn't have accomplished all that we have without them.

Their summer break will soon be over and they will have to return to school. But they promised us

We Did Not Want Him to Leave All Alone on Such a Hot Day.

Amidst the heat wave sweeping across the country, with the temperature reaching its highest level in 111 years, Dail Little Heaven, a nursing facility for the homeless, continued its operations in the summer of 2018.

We purchased summer clothes for the residents and used cooling systems to help them stay cool and comfortable during the heat wave.

Despite these efforts, however, four residents died in July and August due to cancer and other serious illnesses.

Mr. Jeon, who passed away, said, "Why would I want to live longer? I'd rather not receive any more hospital treatment," as soon as he arrived at Dail Little Heaven. Although he started gaining hope while receiving pain control therapy at the hospice ward, he unfortunately died from pancreatic cancer. We were told who his next

of kin was, so regrettably there were no family members by his side in his last moments.

Mr. Kim, on the other hand, was introduced to Dail Little Heaven by the Salvation Army Bridge Center. He suffered from stomach cancer, which became metastatic and spread to his liver. He gradually had trouble eating and digesting his food, and he grew weaker and emaciated by the day. Due to the aggravated symptoms, he was transferred to a hospice unit of an oncology center for pain control, but he eventually died. I don't think I'll ever be able to forget the way he smiled happily despite his illness.

When Mr. Lee came to us for consultation, we learned that he had not been in touch with his family for 10 years. I remember him going to Dongmyo Market alone and returning with his purchases and a smile saying, "Even the small things are precious. I'm glad I purchased these





valuable goods.” He received medical assistance service for prostate cancer. Fortunately, we were able to contact his family before his death and he was able to close his eyes in comfort after seeing his wife, son and daughter.

Mr. Park was diagnosed with stage 4 stomach cancer in his early 30s, and came to Dail Little Heaven with the help of the Seoul Station Homeless Support Center. While consulting on his stay at Dail Little Heaven, he told us that he only had a month left to live.

We had our one last phone call, while he was receiving anti-cancer therapy at a hospital. He said, “I really want to eat ice cream.” Although I paid him a visit at the hospital, I was unable to offer him any ice cream due to his deteriorating health condition. It brings me great sadness to have to say that he said goodbye to the world, without being able to take that much-desired bite of ice cream.

Together with the staff, I made every effort to help these late residents of Dail Little Heaven, and it broke my heart to see some of them die without

their families by their bedside.

For all four of the deceased, I visited the -gu offices and community centers in an effort to find their next of kin. As a result, I was able to find the next of kin for some of them and run the Return-to-Heaven Program, where the family members got to be with the deceased in their last moments.

The staff of Dail Little Heaven carries out the Return-to-Heaven Program all year round, while searching and waiting for the families of our residents. Our entire staff gave their all, without showing a hint of fatigue, trying to accommodate the residents in their final moments of life.

At Dail Little Heaven, we will continue to look after each and every one of our residents until their final days, as a responsible and dedicated nursing facility for the homeless.

Engraving the Importance of Sharing in the Heart Together with Children, Our Hope for the Future

1. Could you introduce Bongeun Elementary School?

Bongeun Elementary School was founded in 1982 and its 36th Graduation Ceremony was held in February 2018. I was appointed as the 11th principal of the school on March 1, 2016. There are currently around 600 students in 24 different classes as well as 63 teachers and staff members.

2. The “sharing culture” is spreading across our society. We wonder whether there was a special impetus for you to teach your students to practice sharing.

The students at Bongeun Elementary School take for granted the high standards of living they get to enjoy, and many of them have never met anyone with a disability or suffering from hardships. This is why I wanted to nurture them into people who look after and share with the underprivileged. I also believe that many of our students will grow up to become leaders of our society, and I wanted to teach them to be considerate of the marginalized classes.

3. We are curious about the response from the teachers and parents who volunteered with the students through the orchestra program and Babfor.

The parents said that they felt very proud after volunteering at Babfor and that they learned how volunteering doesn't just benefit the receiving end but that it actually brings joy to the volunteers. They said they loved volunteering and that it was the best way to provide their children with character education. They asked me to continue the volunteer programs (as evident by the letter sent in by Ain's mother).

The students said that they were surprised to see so many people suffering from hardships and to learn that many of them can't even afford to buy food, and that this was a valuable learning experience for them.

4. What does “sharing” mean to you?

I had been an educator who wanted to educate people on sharing. But while volunteering alongside the students, parents and teachers, volunteering has become a valuable activity that brings me great joy.

Sharing is like a “happiness virus” that infects me with happiness.

5. Please share a few words with Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters and Dail Community.

It's fortunate that there are a growing number of people and organizations willing to volunteer, but because many of the volunteers come in occasionally, there are times when the members of the volunteer organization say hurtful things to the volunteers. (This is not the case with Dail Community, however.) I hope that volunteers can learn the joy of sharing without becoming emotionally hurt. You are doing a great job, and I hope you never change.

I volunteered at Babfor Sharing Community to help the elderly who face difficulties every single day. I was told that Babfor Sharing Community has been providing free meals to neighbors in need since 1988. I was assigned the task of taking away the food trays and cleaning the tables after people finished their meal so that other people could sit and eat. At first, I thought it'd be fun and easy. But as soon as I saw an elderly woman in raggedy clothes and a young man who was blind and acted like a child, I realized that there are people born with disabilities that presented them difficulties in carrying out day-to-day activities who need to be taken care of. That is why the roles of the central and local governments are so important, which is what my teacher has taught me. However, until the day comes when there is a system in place to help everyone in need, I shall do my part by giving people the hope they need to endure each day, and I was able to do that through Babfor. At the end of my last day with Babfor, I got to eat jumeokbap (rice ball), and it was so delicious that I ate two of them! The volunteer group said to me that when it comes to volunteering, I should start doing what I can do now, no matter how small it may be, and I find those words very memorable.

I volunteered at Babfor, providing meals to the homeless. The Challengers and Chaperones were each assigned a specific task such as scooping rice and putting it on the food tray, handing out spoons, counting the number of meal recipients and so on. The homeless and seniors praised the children for handing out food and I felt very proud. I think the way we said, "We hope you enjoy your meal," while handing out the spoons made them happier than just giving them food. At the end of the day, the students got to learn how the program began. We were told that the program was created by a pastor who realized that what the homeless truly needed was a warm meal, rather than money, after seeing an elderly man collapsing due to hunger. After hearing this story, I realize that a meal, which most of us get to eat three times a day, is something that's very special and precious to some people, and I felt ashamed thinking back to how lightly I thought of meals.
